#### **Yard Waste Collections**

Curb side yard waste collections for 2022 will be, April 7, May 26, June 16, September 15, November 10, December 1. DPW yard drop off dates are July 16 and August 13.

Please place yard waste and brush at the curb by 6:00 a.m.
Place items within 6 feet of the road if possible.

Do not put out non-compostable materials for yard waste pickup.
Yard waste must be placed in compostable paper bags.

### Yard waste will not be collected in any kind of plastic bags

Brush must be in bundles weighing no more than 50 lbs. and in lengths of no more than 4 feet. Materials that exceed the weight or length limit will not be collected.

#### **Adopt-A-Drain Launches March 22**

In collaboration with the Village of Mukwonago, Waukesha County will launch an Adopt-A-Drain program on March 22<sup>nd</sup>, World Water Day. Volunteers who adopt a storm drain remove debris buildup from storm drain surfaces twice a month in their neighborhood and report their work.

The village's storm sewer is our first defense against flooding. Summer storms provide a large volume of runoff which flows off surfaces like roadways and rooftops, along the curb, then into storm drain inlets. From there, it travels through the underground pipe network and flows directly into the Mukwonago River and local lakes. Runoff carries many pollutants such as pet waste, oil, fertilizers and organic matter into our local waters affecting the quality of our lakes and rivers. The Mukwonago River flows into the Fox River, which flows into the Illinois River and eventually the Mississippi River where it enters the ocean in the Gulf of Mexico. All this accumulated pollution has created a dead zone of over 6300 square miles in the Gulf of Mexico. Department of Public Works crews are busy sweeping roads and cleaning storm drains in an effort to keep the system clean and clear. In between Public Works cleanings, leaves and debris can build up on top of storm drain grates. The village is asking for your help! Volunteers will be provided a storm drain marker and safety vest to wear while cleaning the drain area. After cleaning, volunteers report into the database the amount and types of materials they removed. This information will be used to identify and help fix issues at the source of the debris,

to optimize cleaning efforts, and to prevent pollutants from entering our storm system and affecting our waters.

Storm water flows directly through storm sewer inlets and storm sewer pipes into the Mukwonago River and our beautiful lakes. This runoff water is not treated, bringing pollution into the water.

The Mukwonago Utilities are notifying you of a 3% rate increase for the Water and 5% for the Sewer Utilities in 2022. We strive to keep rates as low as possible but as our operating costs increase, we need to do minimal annual increases in order to keep the services in good operating repair. The increase will cost the average residential user of 44,000/GPY \$3.48 per quarter for water and \$5.11 per quarter for Sewer.

Below is an example of the 2022 Rate Schedule for a normal Residential Meter (5/8 inch or <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> inch):

Sewer Base Rate - Quarterly	\$35.65
Sewer Usage (Volume per 1,000 gals)	\$6.42/1,000 gals
Water Base Rate - Quarterly	\$33.95
Water Usage (Volume per 25,000 gal per qtr)	\$4.95/1,000 gals
Stormwater (Volume per ERU)	\$7.63/ per ERU
Public Fire Protection - Quarterly	\$34.69
Recycling Residential - Quarterly	\$22.17
